Election of New Board Members

Once again it is time to recruit new Board Members. There are four positions that are up for re-election this year. The Board is thankful for those who have served this past year by giving their time and efforts. A special thanks goes to those members rotating off the Board—James Kingman, Charlie Rudd and Matt Dolan.

There are four officer positions on the Board—President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. In addition, there are several standing committees and the Board members chair these committees. The committees are:

- Community Affairs: This committee works with other community organizations to keep our neighborhood up-to-date on activities that may affect us— such as the GA DOT Revive 285 initiative, the Georgetown Corridor initiative and the potential city of Brookhaven. They should try to attend City of Chamblee council meetings, AACA meetings and others that affect our area.
- Communications: This committee handles all of our communications, including our quarterly newsletter, our Yahoo email list and our website. The manager of the website is a member of this committee and they should have experience developing and managing a website. We would like to improve and expand our website, and bring it to the next level, as we have done with our newsletter.
- **Membership:** This committee keeps an up-to-date list of members, sends welcome notes to new members, encourages membership among neighborhood residents, manages the annual membership renewal process and the elections, etc.
- Property Relations: This committee implements programs to enhance the safety
 and security of the Neighborhood as well as to protect property values throughout.
 This includes maintaining common areas and taking measures to ensure all properties
 maintain compliance with local zoning and code regulations. This committee works
 with city officials on code enforcement issues. The Neighborhood Watch program
 is part of this committee.

The Board meets monthly (or every other month, depending on how much is going on). We even have pizza and drinks at times! We also keep in touch frequently via email between meetings to make plans and keep moving forward.

We have some interest already from neighborhood members but we hope that you will put your hat in the ring! In order to run for the Board, you must be a paid member of the HHNA. Traffic Calming

Residents of Huntley Hills, led by Leslie Freymann, worked with the DeKalb County traffic department for over a year to design the traffic calming plan for our neighborhood. After being approved by more than 65% of the impacted residents, the DeKalb County commission adopted the plan in January 2010.

The plan is being implemented in three phases. The first phase was completed in July 2010 and consisted of installing 20 speed tables throughout the neighborhood on Longview, Admiral, Ellwyn and Plantation. We immediately noticed a reduction in the speed on these streets, as it is very difficult to drive over them at more than 25 mph without damaging your car or at least getting a severe jolt.

The second phase was implemented last summer. Five-foot wide bike lanes were painted on Longview Drive. They are being used frequently by people walking, running, biking or pushing strollers. Many neighbors have commented how much they enjoy using them and how much safer they feel now while walking or biking on Longview. Striping was also painted on sections of Admiral, Ellwyn and Plantation. These are not intended to be biking or walking lanes, as they are only two to three feet wide. The purpose of the striping is to visibly reduce the width of the street. This causes people to drive closer to the center of the road, which in turn causes them to slow down when passing a car coming in the opposite direction.

The third and final phase will be installed this year. It will include three traffic circles on Longview, plus a center island in front of the park. The traffic circles will be located at the three intersections on Longview that do not have a stop sign – Admiral (on the north end of Longview), Ellwyn and Commander. Huntley Hills will be breaking new ground, as we will be the first residential area in DeKalb County to have traffic circles! Unfortunately, this has caused a delay as the Traffic Department has to develop the design for them. And they need to work with engineers and other county officials to ensure that they follow all the appropriate guidelines and regulations. The wheels of government turn slowly. However, work is progressing and we remain confident that we will have traffic circles this year.

The design for the center island in front of the park is much simpler and has already been completed. The Traffic Department has passed it on to the Construction Department which will actually do the work. It will be three feet wide and will have dirt in the middle for planting. We anticipate having it installed this spring. We will keep you posted on the progress in future newsletters.



Huntley Hills Neighborhood Watch Update

Crime Prevention Meeting

In an effort to improve the security of our neighborhood, our residents were asked for their suggestions on what we could do. This was followed up by a meeting with the Chamblee Chief of Police. We concluded that there were **10 points** critical to the improvement of security in Huntley Hills.

- 1. Lighting: Turn on those porch lights
- 2. Lock Your Car: ALWAYS, and NEVER leave valuables in sight.
- **3. Report Suspicious Activity:** If you see anything or anyone suspicious, odd, unusual—anything that doesn't seem "right"—CALL 911.
- **4. Do not advertise your absence** from our home. Keep those newspapers clear of the driveway, leave that light on and bring in the mail.
- **5. Be a Good Neighbor:** Get to know your neighbors, their faces, their cars. Knowing who belongs around and who doesn't makes all the difference.
- **6. Register with the Chamblee Police** Vacation Program (the main Chamblee Police Dept number is (770) 986-5005) when you go out of town, and join the Neighborhood Watch Program.
- 7. Purchase either a monitored or unmonitored alarm system, post security yard signs, and place an alarm sticker on each window.
- **8.** Along the "Stop Feeding the Criminals" concept, try to keep this in mind whenever you're tempted to leave something valuable in your car, forget to lock doors, think it's fine not set the alarm this time. Ounce of Prevention.
- **9.** If a solicitor knocks on your door, remember that you do not need to answer. If you have any concerns, call 911.
- **10.** Contact the police department and have them come out and do a free Security Audit for your home.


News from the Huntley Hills Elementary School (HHES) PTA

Officer Davis stated that miscellaneous complaints increased due to property maintenance issues. The applicable code sections are shown below:

Sec. 614. Parking In Residential Zoning Districts.

Parking any automobile, motorcycle, motor vehicle or trailer shall not be allowed in the front yard, side yard or rear yard of a residence unless said automobile, motorcycle, motor vehicle or trailer is parked on a concrete, asphalt or gravel driveway or parking area. It shall be unlawful to park any automobile, motorcycle, motor vehicle or trailer on the grass, lawn or dirt areas in the yard of any residence located within the corporate boundaries of the city. (Ord. No. 545, 8-15-06; Ord. No. 565, 12-19-06)

Sec. 18-97. Exterior Property Areas.

- (a) Accessory structures: Accessory buildings and structures shall be structurally sound and be maintained in good repair or such buildings and structures shall be removed. All surfaces shall be maintained free of broken glass, loose shingles, peeling paint, crumbling stone, brick or cement or other conditions reflective of deterioration or inadequate maintenance. The exterior walls, roofs, windows, window frames, doors, doorframes, foundations and other portions of every building and structure shall be so maintained as to prevent deterioration from water and weather. Damaged materials must be repaired or replaced promptly. Places showing signs of rot, leakage, deterioration or corrosion are to be restored and protected against weathering or seepage.
- **(b) Fences and retaining walls:** All fences and retaining walls on the premises shall be structurally sound and kept in good repair. The fence posts shall be firmly set in a base that does not allow the posts to shift. The fence railings or slatting shall be firmly attached to the supporting posts. Gaps or wedges in a retaining wall shall be restored to the original condition. Fences and retaining walls shall not encroach on the public right-of-way and must be maintained in a manner that will protect the fence or wall from rotting, decay, deterioration, or loss of structural integrity.



BOOM OR KIDS' FAVORITE BEVERAGES NOT ALWAYS HEALTHY BUST?



Fat-free or 1% milk is a healthy beverage option for kids.

Health-conscious parents often worry about what their kids are eating. Those greasy fast food French fries kids love might be cringe-worthy to parents, but it's not just the foods kids request that parents should monitor. Adults and children alike have favorite beverages that may or may not be healthy. But which beverages are beneficial and which should be avoided? The answer to that isn't always absolute. The following breakdown can help health-conscious parents determine which drinks their kids can continue to enjoy as well as which ones they should limit or avoid altogether.

Sweetened Drinks

Sweetened drinks can include some fruit punches and other fruit drinks that aren't called "juice." Labels on these beverages often claim "Made with real fruit juice." While that might be true, they're all too often made with a lot of sugar as well. Typically, these drinks do provide some nutritional value, including some vitamins and minerals. However, these drinks are often high in calories, and the amount of vitamins and minerals provided is

minimal. The American

Heart Association suggests the less adults and children have of these drinks. the better off they are. Still, the drinks are not entirely devoid of nutritional value, so parents might want to decide if they'll allow kids to drink sweetened drinks in moderation or remove them from the refrigerator entirely.

Sodas

Sodas have taken quite a public relations hit in the 21st century, and that's likely because they provide no nutritional value. What's more, many sodas provide more sugar than a child's body needs, which will lead to weight gain and possibly even cavities or tooth decay. Children typically love soda, so parents might find it difficult to stop kids' soda consumption entirely. However, soda's status as a sugary, high-calorie drink makes it one beverage most parents will want their kids to avoid. If kids must drink soda, try diet soda instead. Though diet soda also provides no nutritional value, at the very least it's a lower-calorie alternative.

Milk

Milk is perhaps the most difficult beverage for parents to gauge. Many parents assume all milk is the same. However, whole milk and 2% milk contains extra fat the body does not need. All milk provides valuable nutrients like calcium and protein, contributing to strong bones and teeth while helping build strong muscles. But when choosing which milk to give kids, choose fat-free (formerly skim) or 1 percent milk, each of which provides the same amount of nutrients as whole or 2% without also providing unnecessary fat.

Even chocolate milk can be a healthy beverage option for kids. Just be sure to apply the same principles mentioned above (namely, choose nonfat or low-fat chocolate milk) and keep in mind chocolate also comes with extra calories thanks to sugar. So monitor how much chocolate milk kids are drinking.

Water

Kids might be indifferent to water, but water helps maintain a healthy body temperature and can even make skin look better. Water's also important in digestion, helping the body digest food. Kids should drink water every day. In addition, parents who are concerned about their children's weight should encourage them to drink more water. The symptoms of dehydration mimic those of hunger, so kids who don't drink enough water could be mistaking mild dehydration for hunger. Drinking more water might just help kids avoid eating an extra snack or two, indirectly helping them lose weight.
