Neighborhood Watch

On August 18th, several block captains came over to my house for a discussion about the block captain organization, identification of new block captains, and activities in the near future.

Some of the topics discussed include:

- Improving block captain coverage: As currently organized, we have between 15 and 20 blocks without block captains. One of the causes of this is that some of the blocks are a little small. In order to relieve this, we're going to expand a few of the blocks for example our block captains on either end of Commodore can split the houses in between them with no block captain. I'm going to look for a few other opportunities.
- In addition, we do need some additional block captains. Look for communication
 from me on the Yahoo group and the Neighborhood Association website in December
 to support this. If you have interest in becoming more involved in neighborhood issues, please contact me. The Neighborhood
 Association would like to organize more neighborhood events, as well as be more represented in community activities; volunteering
 as a block captain will help us to get you involved.
- Spring block parties: The block captains had some frustration with the neighborhood block parties this last spring; we had block
 captains who held parties where no one showed up, and we had residents with no block captain or one not planning a party, with
 no place to go.
- For 2013, I am going to try to better communicate the block party plan for the whole neighborhood. We will be looking for block captains either by themselves, or 2 or 3 working together to plan parties during April or May for their neighbors. I will act as a master clearing house for block parties, so that, for any residents who don't know where or when they can go for a block party, I can help. Look for more information on this, on the Yahoo Group in the first quarter.

One additional area I plan to work on by the end of the year is to provide supplemental lists of neighborhood watch oriented resources on the HHNA website at http://huntleyhills.net. Please look for a refresh of the content on the 'Safety' page during December. Upcoming Event – Holiday Decorating Contest



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Spotlight on Kay Packard

Kay and her husband Randy moved into the neighborhood in 1966. Randy was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease in 1984. Kay did some gardening and bird feeding over the years but really got involved when she realized what pleasure it gave Randy! Although he was bedridden most of the time, he could look out the windows and enjoy watching the birds! So Kay began researching and gathering all the information she could about attracting birds to her garden. When he was up for it, she also took Randy on "fieldtrips" to visit garden spots in the state. Kay became involved with the Georgia Wildlife Federation, the National Wildlife Federation, Georgia Division of Natural Resources, the Chattahoochee Nature Preserve, and many other organizations.

After Randy passed away in 1994, Kay found herself becoming more and more involved with wildlife habitat and gardening, and over the next 15 years became well known in the gardening community as a gardening expert, teacher, speaker, and advisor.

Kay went thru the Georgia Master Gardener Program in DeKalb County in 1996. Many of you probably don't know that the butterfly garden in the Huntley Hills Park was Kay's master gardener project. Kay designed and planted the butterfly garden. She said while she was working on the garden, she really started getting to know people in the neighborhood. During this time she also took gardening classes whenever she could and became very involved with numerous organizations. She began doing classes or programs for garden clubs, schools, and church groups. Kay's many jobs included tireless volunteering in Clairmont Park, in area stream cleanups and at Huntley Hills Elementary and Chamblee High School. In addition to the butterfly garden, Kay is responsible for getting the neighborhood involved in beautifying the neighborhood triangle at North Shallowford and Longview. For years there were regular Saturday workdays at the triangle.

Kay started writing gardening articles for the Huntley hills newsletters, and at the urging of neighbors, started an informal, casual garden club with members from all over this area. Each month, she would write a gardening letter with monthly meeting information included, and generally at her own expense, mail it to a hundred or more gardeners. At last count she has accumulated over 500 email addresses from all over! Everyone looked forward to her newsletters - she is a beautiful writer. Meetings were held at various places over the years -Kay's home, Leslie Robson's driveway, the swim/tennis clubhouse, Lowe's employee conference room, Senior connections, and the D'Youville Condominiums clubhouse. The garden club dues were \$10/year - "optional" - per Kay!! The garden club always had great speakers/ programs, and a number of times Kay paid for the speakers from her own money. Some of my favorite programs were: all about monarch butterflies and a slide show of a trip to Mexico where they migrate in the winter, nocturnal wildlife presented by the Georgia Conservancy, English Gardens, and a design plan for a small back yard. There were so many different gardening topics covered though - a great learning opportunity pruning, container gardening, amending soil, composting, lawn care, vegetable gardening, native plants, and many other topics.

Kay started working with the neighborhood and community to become Certified Wildlife Habitats around 2000. As part of that program, she started the annual habitat garden tour – to show everyone they can have beautiful and wildlife friendly gardens. After much hard work, Chamblee (zip code 30341) became a Certified Wildlife Habitat Community in 2003.

The City of Chamblee designated Monday, September 22, 2008 as "Kay Packard Appreciation Day" in Chamblee, Georgia to recognize Kay's contribution to the City's Community Wildlife Habitat program. The City, with the help of city council member Leslie Robson, had a reception for Kay at the Huntley Hills Park, and Kay's favorite tree, the Wax Myrtle, was planted in the park in her honor. Representatives from the National Wildlife Federation traveled from the Washington, DC area to attend the reception.

In the last couple of years, Kay has slowed down a bit, and finally decided it was time to step down from running the garden club. Since there was no one ready to take over the reins, the garden club stopped meeting, and donated most of their excess funds to the National Wildlife Federation in honor of Kay. Funds were also given to the HHNA to be used to encourage neighborhood wildlife habitats.

Kay says she always felt like all her work over the years was her "gift" to the community. And although she enjoys the beauty of the trees, shrubs and perennials, the gardening was/is all about "wildlife habitat" – providing shelter, food, water, and places to raise their young!!

Kay still gardens when she can, and says her inspiration for gardening came from Sara B. Stein's book "Noah's Garden". Another favorite of Kay's and the source of many of her newsletter "quotes" is the poet Gwen Frostic.

Bird Watching – Be on the look-out for Warblers

Warblers are a family of colorful little birds that live by picking insects off the leaves and bark of trees. Most of the ones we see here spend the greater part of the year in Central or South America, but travel north in nesting season. Many of them can be found in Georgia in the Spring and Fall, on their way to places as far as northern Canada or Brazil. But there are three members of the family that spend their winters in Georgia. They can be attracted to your yard if you have a suet feeder. Two years ago during our especially cold winter I had three different species that were regular visitors.

The most common of these is the Yellow-rumped Warbler. The picture shows a male in spring plumage, but even in winter they are almost this colorful. The females and first year offspring are duller, but all sport a bright yellow rump patch.

The Pine Warbler is usually harder to find as it lives high in the pines. It does have a fairly distinctive call, which is good for identifying it even if you can't see it. Notice the white wing bars, yellow eye ring, breast and throat.

The Orange-crowned Warbler is a bird that would seem to be misnamed – I have never seen this orange crown, although bird banders say it is buried under the

greyish feathers and rarely shown. It looks so drab that for a long time I couldn't figure out how to identify it. – no wing bars, little color, just a faint dark bar through the eye. But then someone pointed out to me that the underside of the tail is bright yellow.

Get a suet feeder and look for these in your yard when the weather turns cold.

Chamblee High School Construction Update

Construction of the new Chamblee High School is on schedule with the four story main building being "topped-out" (meaning the roof is finished) in December. The natatorium's foundation is cast and the structural steel in that location will be started soon. Most of the underground utilities are in and site work continues.

Gardening in Huntley Hills

Greetings fellow gardeners. I am in a rush to get this newsletter to print - as usual it seems! I don't really have much gardening news except that fall and winter are really great times to plant trees, and most shrubs and perennials. It is also a great time to "move" plants - you know that bush you planted that is getting too much sun, or the tree that is going to be too large for where it is planted. I have a list of several things I need to move this winter – including a tree, at least two shrubs, and several perennials. It seems most everything I plant ends up getting moved about 3 times before I find just the right spot!

My plant ID choice for this issue is the American Beautyberry Shrub – Calicarpa Americana. It is a sun loving native plant, grows to about 6 feet tall and wide but can and should be pruned back pretty severely in the early spring. This shrub is loaded with clusters of small berries in late summer, which turn a vibrant purple starting around late August/ September. The birds love the berries – so

it is definitely a shrub that Kay has in her yard – food for wildlife. I have included a couple of pictures – one of the early berries, and then when they turn purple. There is also a variety that gets white berries.

And remember in the last issue I discussed the Virginia creeper and mentioned that it has pretty fall foliage – I am including one picture to show you.

In keeping with Kay's desire to take care of wildlife, and since Dick, in his article on Warbler's suggested everyone hang a suet feeder and watch for the Warblers, I am including a recipe for suet that maybe you will try. I think making your own suet would be a great activity to involve the children in, it is much less expensive than buying suet, and the birds love it!

I got the recipe on the following page from the October/November 2000 Birds and Blooms magazine. What a great magazine – I don't know why I stopped getting it – they had (have) the most spectacular photographs.









Feed the Birds - Suet Recipe

1 lb lard (Publix has 1 pound bars of lard where the Crisco is)
16-20 ounces crunchy peanut butter
³/₄ to 1 cup raisins
³/₄ to 1 cup sunflower meats
6 cups cornmeal
5 cups all-purpose flour

Note: Hasting's sells sunflower meats by the pound. I have also seen it in the birdfood section of the grocery store. I buy the cheapest cornmeal and flour I can find. And Yes – you have to use lard, not oil. Lard is solid at room temperature, oil is not!

The recipe was provided by a reader who lived in Florida and said the suet holds up to the hot Florida weather. I can attest to that – just don't hang it in direct sunlight. Woodpeckers, chickadees, titmice, bluejays, brown thrashers and many more birds seem to enjoy the suet. If you try it, let me know how it turns out!! ametheny@comcast.net

One last thing – I hope you enjoy the seasonal photographs - all taken in our neighborhood. I really hope they make you realize and appreciate how fortunate we are to live in a community with so much natural beauty! I expect that every home in Huntley hills has a view of "nature". Although there are "niceties" in the newer homes and subdivisions - they will never have the beauty and tranquility that we enjoy in our older subdivision. Please take care of your trees - they are what make this subdivision special! So when we are suffering from lack of rain - I encourage you to water the trees (around the drip line – not near the trunk) – they are irreplaceable. worry about the grass - it can be replaced instantly almost!! Also, I would love help with the photography - I'm not much of a photographer and have a very limited camera! Enjoy nature!!

On low heat, melt lard in a very large pan (soup pot size- 8-10 quarts). Remove from heat and add peanut butter until melted. Stir in raisins and sunflower seed. Gradually mix in the cornmeal and flour until it gets to the right consistency (you may not need all of it) – where you can make a ball that will stick together but is not too gooey. I just make fat hamburger size patties (suet doesn't have to be square!!) Any size or shape works fine as long as it will fit in the suet feeder. I place them on a cookie sheet and freeze them. Once frozen, I put in individual sandwich bags and keep in the freezer. You can put a frozen suet cake in the feeder and once the birds/squirrels find it – mine usually don't last long.
