In Fiscal Year 2018, the Huntley Hills Neighborhood Association had \$10,150.00 in revenue and \$11,160.00 in expenses. Our main two sources of revenue were membership dues and the newsletter. In 2018, we brought in \$4,985.00 in membership dues and \$3,635.00 in selling newsletter advertisements. Publishing the newsletter is also our biggest expense; publication cost \$3,740.00 in 2018. After the newsletter, our next largest expense was \$1,530.00 for social events. The annual Huntley Hills Street Party was our main social expense at a cost of \$950.00. In 2018, the Neighborhood Association gave back to the community, donating \$1,000.00 to the Huntley Hills PTA for rejuvenating the courtyard garden. The money helped with expenses associated with removing weeds and installing raised beds for the elementary school's garden club. For the first time, the HHNA designed and sold retro Huntley currently a member of the Huntley Hills Neighborhood Association – thank you. This publication wouldn't be possible without your annual dues. If you need to renew or are thinking of joining for the first time, check out page 27 for additional information. We strive to be a resource to you yearround and hope this newsletter provides value to you now and in the months ahead. Finally, to all of our advertisers (new, returning, and future!), you've got a fan in us. Thanks for your support of this newsletter and for what you bring to Chamblee. And now, on to the main attraction!





The Latest from Huntley Hills Elementary

It's a pleasure to get to share our latest round of updates with you from the Huntley Hills PTA, including that school will be starting on August 5th! Be sure to slow down and pay attention to the students and parents on their way to our neighborhood elementary school.

We had two very successful fundraisers last year: Fall Festival, held the end of October, and Fueled by Fitness, a pledge drive in March that ends in a day of running for all of the students. Between those fundraisers, we raised over \$26,000 to invest back into Huntley Hills Elementary! Thanks to the fundraisers we are in the process of installing new benches, tables, and shade structures around the playground and courtyard. Last year we also

installed a new Water Bottle Filler in the gym and received a \$5,000 grant from Lowes to improve our Courtyard Garden. With those funds, we have already



installed new raised beds and a new fence. The newly created Garden Club has kept the garden much more manageable and even produced enough food in the garden to host their families to sample their harvest. An arbor and more tables are coming soon, and we hope to get the aquaponics back up and running in the garden this year. We're happy to report that this year three teachers will be attending a Master Gardener Program through Fernbank to continue the growth of our courtyard garden. It's exciting to see so much happening in there!



Another goal for the year is to continue to grow our collaboration with the different groups included at the school and in the surrounding areas. This summer the HH Education Foundation, PAC, and PTA met to start setting goals and figure out how we can work together to improve the educational



experience and involvement at Huntley Hills Elementary.

We are always looking for volunteers and neighborhood involvement. We hold three Books Fairs each year, and the public is welcome to come shop, as well! Purchases benefit the school, so keep an eye out for our Book Fair signs. Fall Festival will be held Saturday, October 26; it is a community-wide event, and we have something for all ages to do. Look for updates on events and volunteer opportunities happening on our Facebook page or our website **www.hhes-pta.com**.

City of Chamblee Launches "Citibot"

The City of Chamblee is the first city in Georgia to launch a new texting service called "Citibot". Anyone can use their mobile phone's existing texting service to make requests, report issues, or find answers to common city-related questions.

"As a city, we want to provide the highest quality customer service while being accessible via all modes of communication. Citibot enables us to be connected to all constituents through text messaging," says Chamblee Mayor Eric Clarkson. "We want to be available through all channels," Mayor Clarkson adds. "We have the website, the app, via phone, and now texting. No matter how you prefer to reach us, we'll be there."

"We are proud to be the first municipality in Georgia to enable its residents to interactively text message with local government. Citibot helps us scale up this aspect of customer service," adds Chamblee City Manager Jon Walker.

To start a conversation with Chamblee's Citibot, text "hello" to 470-450-2533. When a text comes in, an alert will go directly to Chamblee's "to-do list" of requests. The request will be sent to the appropriate department, prioritized, and handled efficiently. The tool will help address multiple issues quickly, reduce turnaround timed, and enhance team productively.

With Citibot, residents of Chamblee can text message in questions to quickly access relevant city information about business licenses, trash pickup times, permitting info, and public meeting announcements, for example. Constituents also can crowdsource city issues, including reporting potholes, broken street signs, and missed trash pickups, all through an interactive chatbot that responds immediately to a text message. When the city fixes the reported issue, Citibot follows up to let the resident know their query has been resolved. Texting eliminates lengthy website searches and reduces customer service calls.

"Cities like Chamblee are leading the way by delivering powerful solutions to maximizing efficiency and enhancing access to information and vital services," says Bratton Riley, CEO and co-founder of Citibot.

Who Really Owns Huntley Hills Park?

Over the years several residents living in Huntley Hills have inquired about the ownership of the neighborhood park; and a few have learned through multiple conversations and emails, with the City and County, that the answer isn't all that clear. multiple contacts over the last 3 years with several different DeKalb County offices, asking to acquire the park property. "So far, the city's requests haven't produced an exchange of ownership; however, the City vows to continue the push for acquiring this

> property," said Deputy City Manager Al Wiggins.

So why not let the county take over the maintenance of the park? "Although property tax records show the park is owned by the county, the City of Chamblee continues to maintain the park and park amenities, because we have a duty to maintain what was placed there by the City," said Jodie Gilfillan, Parks and Recreation Director. "Chamblee has been maintaining this park longer than the records reveal, and most (if not all) of the equipment, amenities, and signage were placed there by the City."

Will the City add new equipment and amenities to the park? "Not until the City owns the park will we be able to add equipment and amenities", said Gilfillan. "Hopefully, this happens in the near future, as several amenities are starting to show their age."

It all started in the fall of 2016 when the City of Chamblee applied for a stream buffer variance to install a permanent gazebo structure in the park. City staff thought this was a simple request until they received a letter back from DeKalb stating the request for variance was denied. Denied? What? Yes, that is right, it was denied because the City of Chamblee does not own the property according to the letter,which stated the owner was DeKalb County.

City employees immediately went to work researching documentation from 1957 to present day. What they found was that in 1957 there was a plat that designated the streets and park for public use. In 1970 the deed to the property changed hands and was acquired by an engineering company then conveyed to a realty company, Stratford Realty. In 1975, Stratford Realty sent letters to then Chamblee Mayor, Woody Malone, for purchase of the property designated "Park". In 1976, Mayor Malone referenced telephone conversations in a letter to Stratford Realty and Stratford Realty responded with return letters also referencing telephone conversations.

This is where the documentation trail stops and fast forwards to present day where staff have made

The Awesome Table

Most of us are familiar with The Awesome Table, the brightly colored sideboard at the corner of Plantation and Longview. When I first moved to the neighborhood, it was far and away the most intriguing, quirky, and delightful bit of Huntley Hills charm that confirmed all feelings that this was the place I wanted to be. But I was eager to know more - who were the folks behind this local community exchange and where did the idea come from? I spoke with Leslie and Gordon Freymann, the pair at the heart of The Awesome Table, to learn their story.

While the Freymanns are long-time Huntley Hills residents (Leslie has even graced the board of this fair neighborhood association), The Awesome Table began in September 2014 after a chance mention from friends of the Freymanns visiting from Athens. A neighbor of theirs had started something similar and the idea struck a chord with Leslie. She was in the midst of incorporating greater minimalism in her life and the notion that you could feel awesome by decluttering your house and giving something awesome to a neighbor hit all the right notes. In turn, the neighbor feels awesome for getting something for free, and the positive karma cycle repeats.

Since its inception, The Awesome Table has seen its fair share of truly awesome merchandise. For Leslie, any time holiday decorations, jewelry, or kids' toys and craft supplies make an appearance, she knows they'll be a hit. When asked to name her hands down favorite thing to have ever graced The Awesome Table, Leslie recalls a gently used bright orange purse to which her daughter took an immediate shine. She carried it with her everywhere, including to the pool where the neighbor who'd shared it on The Awesome Table happened to see her. Later on a Nextdoor post about The Awesome Table, the neighbor commented that she saw her purse being proudly carried around the pool and it made her happy to know her purchase from a boutique in New York was getting a second life. That's pretty awesome.



While The Awesome Table is by and large wellmaintained and monitored by the community it serves, Leslie said she'd encourage each Huntley Hills resident to feel a degree of ownership over the table. In part, that means adhering to a certain standard of Awesome Table etiquette. Please no alcohol, sharp knives, or open food; bags of clothes and large items like furniture are better serviced by Goodwill or another charity. Keep an eye on the weather forecast and consider leaving your treasures on a day that doesn't call for rain. If someone sees the table looking a little less than awesome, please feel free to remove any trash or take items that have been sitting for a long time to a local charity.



It's been almost five years since Huntley Hills got its Awesome Table. What started with a garden table the Freymanns picked up from Allison Metheny has become the staple it is today with the help of many of our neighbors over the years. A special nod of recognition goes to Ross Lanning, creator of the famed Awesome Table sign. But, without each of us, The Awesome Table would likely be just an eccentric piece of furniture perched in someone's front yard. Instead, it's something much more. I think this story really says it all: a young boy was riding by on his bicycle when he spied both an awesome scooter he wanted for himself as well as a lovely vase he aimed to take home for his mom. Leslie watched as he struggled to negotiate the bicycle, the scooter, and the vase all in one go. It was about independence and pride for him, she said. And for me, it's about those experiences behind the table that make it so special.

The Grass Is Always Greener on the Other Side...

Ever wonder why your neighbor's grass is always greener? Maybe it's because she has better weeds – or perhaps it's because he's the meticulous one – or they just might have a really good local landscaper doing it for them. If you're the type that likes to tackle it yourself, we'll spend the next few minutes unpacking some lawn care tips that might make your neighbors green with envy...

First, we'll begin with a quick lesson on fertilizers. All fertilizers contain three macro-nutrients used by plants: Nitrogen (N), Phosphorus (P), and Potassium (K). Think of these three nutrients (N-P-K) as Up, Down, All Around...

- Nitrogen (N) nitrogen is largely responsible for the growth of leaves on the plant (UP, or above the soil)
- Phosphorus (P) phosphorous is responsible for root growth (DOWN, or below the soil) and flower & fruit development
- Potassium (K) potassium helps the overall health of the plant, much like vitamins do for us (ALL AROUND)

So... now you're armed with just enough information to make sense of a fertilizer bag. You'll see numbers like 29-0-3 (N-P-K) on a bag of regular lawn fertilizer. Makes sense, right? High nitrogen (up) content to give it a good boost and green up the grass. Or consider a 24-25-4 starter fertilizer used when seeding or overseeding new grass; notice the emphasis on the P (or down) to feed, stimulate, and establish the new root system. Another example is fall fertilizer with an analysis of 28-0-10; it gives a boost of potassium (all around) to give the plant its vitamins for winter survival. The bottom line is there are a ton of different fertilizer mixes and formulations – and they're designed to feed specific grass types, at specific times of the year, for specific applications.

When considering a treatment program for your lawn, it is best to know what type of grass you have. We will focus on Bermuda and Fescue lawns, which are the two most common and widely seen in our area. If you have another type of grass, such as Zoysia or Centipede, please come see us so we can put together a custom treatment plan tailored to your lawn – it is **important to use products that are specially formulated** for these types of grasses. For Bermuda/Fescue, we recommend a good 5-step program, similar to the one outlined below:



Step 1 – Spring Pre-Emergent: apply February through early March. This will prevent crabgrass and other broadleaf weeds that you normally see appearing in your grass in May/June. Probably one of the most important steps, pre-emergents work by preventing the weed from germinating. For best results, we recommend watering it in or putting it down just before a good rain. Caution: do not use pre-emergents in areas where you are planting or overseeding grass seed, as it will prevent the seed from germinating.

Step 2 – **Weed & Feed:** apply May-June. For best results, it is recommended to apply the fertilizer to a damp lawn (morning dew is ideal, or just after a rain) but also making sure no rain is in the 48-hour forecast. This will allow the weed control granules to stick to the plant (the weeds) and do its job. The fertilizer particles will settle to the soil and will be activated with the next rain – so there's no need to water this in immediately.

Step 3 – **Lawn Fertilizer:** apply in July-August. Depending on your circumstances, this step can vary. It can be purchased as just a straight Lawn Fertilizer, a Lawn Fertilizer Plus Insect Control, or a Lawn Fertilizer Plus Weed Control, depending on your lawn's needs. For best results, this step can be watered in immediately unless you're using weed control – if so, follow the guidelines outlined in step 2 above.

Step 4 – **Fall Fertilizer/Winterizer:** apply in October-November. This step is important for providing nutrients and improving the overall health of the grass for survival during the winter months.

Step 5 – Fall Pre-Emergent: apply in November; this step is often missed, and it's extremely visible in February or March, if so. Applying a pre-emergent in late fall will prevent winter weeds such as Poa-Annua and Chickweed from popping up in your lawn in January and February. Just like Step 1, do not use pre-emergents in areas where you are planting grass seed, as it will prevent the seed from germinating.

Home Insight: Hiring a Contractor


You may have seen my renovation project over the last year - it's been a long, difficult process but we're finally done (mostly). Long story short - we ran into a string of bad luck with two different contractors who couldn't get the job done. So here's some advice we've put together to help keep you avoid our misfortune and get out of trouble when contemplating your next home improvement project.

Getting Started

- 1. Get your house appraised.
- 2. Work with a banker to set your budget if you are going to need a loan to complete your project.
- 3. Know what you want to accomplish.
- 4. Working with a builder/contractor and architect together can be helpful to make sure you aren't drawing things you can't afford to build.
- 5. Your scope will determine what kind of contractor you want to hire. Building a multi-story addition with a foundation is very different from remodeling a bathroom. It requires a different type of contractor.

Choosing a Contractor

- When requesting a quote, be open and honest with the contractor about what you're looking for; you should be able to communicate well with them as you'll be in a relationship for the next 3-12 months.
- When requesting a quote, make sure your contractor is licensed, bonded, and insured.
- Ask if they will be supervising the work themselves or using a project manager. You want to make sure a supervisor is onsite at least 80% of the time.
- Plan to be home often or to take significant time away from work to supervise your project. Plan to do regular walkthroughs with the contractor or project manager.
- Labor is currently at a premium; ask if they have a reliable crew they work with regularly and even go so far as to ask for follow up. The best situation is that they employ the trades directly and don't use subcontractors, but this is rare.







Before You Begin Work

- Ask for a contract (most legitimate contractors will readily agree to this).
- Get a lawyer to review the contract. Seriously, it's worth the small fee to do this now rather than going through litigation later and finding out you had no recourse.
- Make sure your contractor and their subcontractors are willing to sign lien waivers prior to each draw and that your contractor is willing to sign an affidavit that they have provided lien waivers from all those who have performed any work associated with each draw.
- Ask the contractor for a fee schedule (when they're paid) as well as an estimated timeline. Ask for copies of all permits and inspection reports. (The city will also have these on file if you want to follow up.)
- Plan to hire a designer if you want someone to help you pick door knobs and faucets that are within your budget. Make sure this person's tastes match yours. Go look at homes they've finished and talk to their references about how easy they were to work with, how well they stayed on budget, and how happy they were with the choices offered.
- Include an extra 20% in your budget for cost overruns.

During the Project

- Plan regular walk-throughs and budget meetings with your contractor.
- Keep digital copies of all the lien waivers your contractor and their subs provide.
- Visit your site often. Make notes at each visit of things you want to bring up with your contractor during your next meeting.
- Let your builder know times that you want to be onsite for the install, for example, if you want to be there to see how the paint or tile look before they finish the job. Other times you might want to be onsite include during the electrical planning, site grading, or landscaping. Decide what's important to you and let your builder know that you want to be onsite during those jobs.
- Make decisions and stick to them.

Red Flags

- As always, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Don't go with the lowest bid, the project is probably being underbid and you'll end up paying for it in the end.
- A legitimate, licensed contractor won't ask you to pull any permits.
- Never pay for work or materials that aren't onsite. It is common for contractors to ask for a deposit on materials like cabinets or countertops. You will likely have to provide an initial deposit to start your project; this should float any deposits you need to make on larger items. Aside from your initial deposit (usually 10-15% of the total project cost) you should never pay for anything that isn't done.
- If your contractor threatens to leave the job, let them.



It identified some fairly simple principles: a consistent sense of belonging; trust in each other and the ruling government; each member unique class called Chamblee 101 that allows citizens to learn the inner workings of city operations. Backyard Fowl Play

Since the City of Chamblee adopted language in the Code of Ordinances in 2015 allowing for up to eight domestic fowl per lot (but no more than one potbelly pig!), the prospect of fresh eggs and feathered companions has compelled a number of our Huntley Hills families to try their hand at backyard chickens. This is one neighbor's story as told by her husband and resident comide-hen.

Anita purchased her chickens after she was inspired by her brother-in-law's birds, which roamed the backdrop of her sister's wedding. He had several varieties, including a Polish chicken named Ms. Cleo (not Mrs. Cleo - she wasn't married).

Anita bought her first four chickens, three Red Stars and one Rhode Island Red, from our friends in Rome, GA who have about 60 chickens on their farm. All of those lay various shades of brown eggs. She bought our last two chickens at Johnson Farm in Bay Minette, AL on the way back from a Gulf Shores vacation. They are both Ameraucana chickens, also known as "Easter Eggers". They can lay blue, pink, yellow, green, or tan eggs due to a liver pigment called oocyanin. We were hoping for a variety of colors, but both of ours lay blue eggs.

The chickens' names are: Amelia Egghart, Henrietta Peckington, Kelly Cluckston, Vera Wing, Sofia Lor-Hen, and Jaundice. We lost Henrietta

mysteriously over New Year's Eve and caught a hawk eating Amelia; the others have not been allowed out of the coop since.

For those seeking more information about backyard chickens, keep your eyes peeled for the next iteration of Chamblee Chicks 101. A project of Keep Chamblee Beautiful, the free introductory courses have previously included information on Chamblee's urban farming code and how to get started with backyard chickens as well as a walking tour of various urban coops and flocks in Huntley Hills!







Huntley Hills Sidewalks

Do you care about sidewalks? Would you like to help get more sidewalks built in Huntley Hills?

The Chamblee Mobility Plan was adopted by the City of Chamblee on May 21, 2019. As part of that plan, the City approved several sidewalk projects in and near Huntley Hills. While the neighborhood does have sidewalks in a few areas, they don't connect. The Mobility Plan includes projects that would fill the gaps and provide continuous sidewalks along many of the major thoroughfares. These projects include sidewalks along Longview, Plantation, Admiral, Elwyn, Forrestal, and North Shallowford. These projects are all unfunded, however, so it may be years before they are constructed.

The City of Chamblee recently amended their Residential Sidewalk Improvement Program so that the city will now construct sidewalks at no cost to the property owner so long as most of the property owners support the project. The threshold is high – the City requires 75% of property owners in the affected area to sign the petition for the sidewalks.

Once the petition has met the 75% threshold, it will be presented to the Mayor and City Council for inclusion in the capital improvement program. If approved by the Council, the City will develop a final project design and cost. In most cases, the existing right-of-way (ROW) for the roads within Huntley Hills should be wide enough to include sidewalks, but any additional ROW for construction or the sidewalk itself will need to be donated.

The City will fund 100% of the cost necessary for construction of any new sidewalk. Funding is limited to the amount budgeted for sidewalks for that current fiscal year and allocated to neighborhoods in the order petitions are approved by the City Council. Any neighborhoods that are approved for the construction of new sidewalks after the current year's budget has been expended will be funded out of future years' budgets in the order that the petitions were approved by the City Council.

I'm planning on starting the petition process for the sidewalks in Huntley Hills to try to move our sidewalks up the priority list. If you're interested in helping, would like a sidewalk on your street, or would like to know more, please contact me at **bdaleray@yahoo.com**.

Our neighbors across the street at 3694 Greenhill had a fire in their house a year ago March. Finally, after 15 months they were able to move back into The family consists of three generations. Moklas Bhuyina immigrated here from Bangladesh in 1986. For years, he was the chef at the Bombay Grill
