Financially, 2022 was a great year for the Neighborhood Association! We started the year with just over \$2,800 in the bank, had LOTS of great events, sold HH T-Shirts, bought street sign toppers and still ended the year with over \$6,400!!! Our total revenue was almost \$16,000 and expenditures were just over \$12,000. The 2022 Year-End Financial Summary in this newsletter gives you the nitty-gritty details, but for a quick overview:

- The **ADMINISTRATIVE** expenses of just over \$2,500 covered organizational fees, website costs and the purchase of Huntley Hills t-shirts which were pre-sold to residents online and at events. Donations of \$330 from members helped offset costs of dog waste station bags, flowers and social events. Late in the year, we received \$1,883 in special donations from 60 residents to replace our aging street sign toppers.
- Our expenditures for neighborhood **BEAUTIFICATION** were just over \$1,700 for dog waste bags, to install one new waste station, for planting materials in the Train Park and traffic islands, and new signage to recognize that the HHNA is maintaining those "common" areas.
- We generated revenue of almost \$7,000 from **MEMBERSHIP** fees and reached our long-time goal of 300 members before the year ended.
- We almost broke even on the **NEWS**-**LETTER** last year with ad revenue of

\$3,092. The cost to print and mail them to every resident was \$3,146. Please continue to support those local businesses that support our activities!

• We added two new **SOCIAL** events in 2022 and enhanced many of our regular annual events for total expenditures of almost \$4,600. To help enhance our biggest event, the Fall Street Party, we received cash donations of over \$1,200 from 12 businesses, along with in-kind donations valued at \$450 from three local businesses.

We ended 2022 with over \$6,400 in the bank and we are off to a good start this year! We added a new event in February, a successful Chili Cookoff, and lined up 6 months of free Yoga sessions in the park. Be sure to watch for the emails and NextDoor/Facebook posts about upcoming events throughout the year. There's something for everyone!

The Latest from Huntley Hills Elementary Deborah Hakes Roney, PTA President

After a few years impacted by COVID-19, the Huntley Hills Elementary and Montessori School PTA was able to return to a full calendar of events and support for staff and students at our neighborhood's local elementary school.



On April 29, we held our second annual Run for the Hills race and festival on school grounds. It was well-attended by many in our school community, with over 250 individuals registered for either the 5k or 1 mile fun run. Families stayed after the race for a festival featuring homemade Guatemalan food, a suite of inflatables and slides, face painting, crafts, and a chance to dunk a favorite teacher. The event saw wonderful support from local businesses, including our race sponsor David Lawhon Compass Real Estate, as well as Gold Level sponsors Kiddie Academy, Jim Ellis Chevrolet, Chamblee Orthodontics, and Ed Voyles Acura and Kia. The end of the school year is busy for all, and during May, PTA supported food, activities, and raffle prizes for Staff Appreciation Week; a science assembly for students; the school's production of Matilda, Jr.; field day; 5th grade graduation activities; and more.

To engage our school families throughout the year, the PTA held monthly Spirit Nights that benefited the school while also supporting local restaurants like Farm Burger and Takorea.

The PTA is powered by donations of time and money, and we are fortunate to live in such a close-knit community in Chamblee that wants to support the school. The Chamblee United Methodist Church holds drives to gather food items and school supplies, and Whole Foods provided a grant for healthy snacks.

Our support also includes a partnership with Keep Chamblee Beautiful for a renovation of



the courtyard garden. The space is now able to be utilized for educational purposes including STEM activities and a thriving student garden club.

"The courtyard garden will not only be a great place for students to learn about gardening, the environment, science, and nature, it will also be a place for relaxation and enjoyment because it is such a beautiful area to spark inspiration and curiosity in our community and our natural environs," said Thais Jones, special education teacher at HHES. "Because of its inclusivity and thoughtfulness in design, all our students will have the opportunity to take joy in and learn from it, regardless of abilities."



Over several months, Dylan cleared a space and constructed benches for students and a chalkboard stand. The classroom has been enjoyed by students and teachers during many fair-weathered days.

Local Tastes

As you may have seen this spring, Chamblee recently announced a new ordinance for an Open Container District downtown that started on July 1, 2023. The district spans from Ingersoll Rand Drive to McGaw Drive and allows individuals to purchase alcohol from licensed establishments in the district from 9am to 10pm with container and amount stipulations. And while this is exciting news for enjoying time out in downtown Chamblee, do you know all the options for an enjoyable evening that stretch the same corridor? Let's explore!

Downtown Chamblee centered around the new Open Container District provides 15 varying establishments (more to come). Within those 15 establishments are two breweries, one distillery, 11 places that provide food and one ice cream shop.

A definite array of options to craft your evening.

To the southwest of the district, you'll find three establishments including Rojo Cocina Mexicana y Cantina, a Mexican restaurant featuring fresh ingredients and

wide array of dishes. Just next door, Yuzu Sushi provides delicacies from Japan including fresh sushi rolled daily. And newest to the group Oaxaca offers traditional Oaxacan inspired cuisine defined by their corn imported from Oaxaca, Mexico. They also have hand crafted cocktails influenced from the region of the birthplace of Mezcal, the smokey little brother to tequila.

As you move northeast along Peachtree Road, you'll find five establishments all within a block or two of each other. Hopstix is the first stop and is an Asian fusion brewpub that features Chamblee's first of two breweries on this list and pairs it with a sushi bar, ramen or poke bowls. Himalayas Indian Fine Dining & Bar is right across the street and relocated from Chamblee Plaza a few years ago but still serves up its Indian staples made in a tandoor oven. BLUETOP Restaurant & Bar,



which serves Americana fast-casual, features a lively open-air space, while next door, Antiguo Lobo is the third Mexican restaurant on this list and features a tequila bar to pair with its menu of dishes from multiple regions throughout Mexico. Lastly, Southbound is a southern comfort food eatery with an inviting atmosphere nestled in a late 1800s building.

As you travel northwest, you arrive at two more casual Chamblee staples, Vintage Pizzeria with its New Jersey influenced thin crust pizza and Frosty Caboose, an Ice Cream Shoppe located on the Norfolk Southern rail line where kids can get a sweet treat and watch the trains fly by. To round out the options, a little further northwest you'll find Gus's World Famous Fried Chicken, a fried

> chicken restaurant based in downtown Memphis, Tennessee that spices up the options and two differing places to grab a drink, Contrast Artisan Ales and the Distillery of Modern Art.

Contrast Artisan Ales, the second brewery on this list, provides a diverse

array of beers and seltzers, and even non-alcoholic options. From fruited sour beers to juicy hopforward IPAs, lagers to barrel-aged dark beers and cocktail inspired gluten-free hard seltzers, there is something for everyone and the offerings are paired with a packed foodie calendar. The Distillery of Modern Art is a craft distillery of artisan spirits that combines a modern art gallery with a cocktail lounge.

Downtown Chamblee provides plenty of options for eating, socializing and grabbing a drink. And, you can even look forward to a new opening in the fall or early 2024, the Chamblee Tap & Market, that will feature a taproom and micro food hall among other offerings! All of these options paired with the new Open Container District should be enjoyable for that relaxing evening out with or without the whole family!

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Creating a New Backyard Space

We moved to Huntley Hills from Brookhaven last July because we loved the neighborhood and found a perfect house for our soon-to-be-growing family. As with any new home, you quickly find areas for improvements and ways to make it your own. For us, that meant creating an outdoor living and entertainment space, and upon moving in, we realized we'd also need some landscape improvements, especially when it rained.

Our first priority was creating an outdoor living space. At our previous home, we had an openair deck off the main living area that was often underutilized because it was too hot, too cold, too wet or too covered in pollen. Our new home in Huntley Hills had a similar configuration—a deck off the main living area and a screened-in porch below—and this time, we really wanted to utilize the area off the main floor during the seasons that mattered most.

Given that, we knew we wanted a covered, screenedin deck that would allow us to extend our living space and serve as a space to entertain. Since this area was destined to be a focal point for fall Saturdays and summer movie nights, we wanted a TV wall in the screened-in portion designed for privacy, and we also wanted an open-air landing for grilling. Along the way, we opted to build a bar top on the openair portion as well to allow for dining, relaxing and grill prep. We chose to leave the new patio below unscreened, opening directly to the backyard.

The work was completed by Graham Culbreth and his team at Decks by GWR, who came highly recommended to us by fellow Huntley Hills residents. His team started just after Thanksgiving, and despite delays from the frigid temperatures and December rains, it was completed by mid-January. We couldn't be more pleased with how it turned out, and it also helped us realize our next project: addressing our backyard drainage issues.

As many Huntley Hills residents know, it's always a gamble how the yard will hold up when the rain comes. Like so many houses in the neighborhood and surrounding areas, we don't just move our own stormwater; we also catch runoff from neighboring yards. During heavy downpours, our backyard would become an extension of the creek that runs between Admiral Drive and Seaman Circle, creating a short-term river through the middle of our yard.

We set out to develop a solution to collect and move as much stormwater as early and upstream as possible then mitigate

the effects of the rainfall our own yard collects naturally. We received quotes and proposals from a number of companies, each with their own proposed solutions and no two alike. We opted for a landscaping company that provided an affordable solution in a relatively quick timeframe.

The solution: we trenched a long dry creek bed that runs parallel to the rear property line and helps collect the rainwater from our uphill neighbor before it reaches our lawn. The trench runs the length of our lawn before discharging in the low area of our backyard. We also upgraded an existing catch basin that was often overwhelmed in heavy rains by runoff from surrounding properties, and we replaced our main drain line in the middle of the yard with a larger pipe to accommodate added catch basins and our gutter downspouts. In addition, to help handle the direct rainfall on our lawn, we added a small network of french drains that tie into the larger drain pipe, all designed to collect and move water to the existing creek area.

Once the drainage work was completed in March, we set out to landscape the hill that slopes from the new dry creek bed to our lawn. We worked with a landscape designer from ServeScape, an online

plant nursery and design studio headquartered in Chamblee, to establish a concept using primarily a mix of native, evergreen shrubs. Our hope is that these shrubs and plants will help prevent additional erosion and provide a scenic landscape to admire from our outdoor living spaces in the years to come.

It's certainly been an eventful first year for us as homeowners in Huntley Hills, and we couldn't be happier with how practical, functional and beautiful these projects turned out. While the work of maintaining a home is never truly complete, until the next project comes along, you can find us enjoying the progress we've made so far. Visitors welcome!

To Buy or Not To Buy?

As the Summer market approaches, many people find themselves sitting on the fence. Let's not kid ourselves, if you needed a reason to NOT buy a home right now, every media outlet has you covered. They list dozens of negatives, what ifs - most of which leave buyers sitting on the proverbial fence. I am going to use math to counter that narrative and hopefully provide a different perspective on the topic. As a licensed loan officer in the state of Georgia, I have this conversation with buyers on a daily basis. I found that using math and some hard numbers equips people to make a better decision. This is where every mother, father or a math teacher is going to nod their head and silently say 'I told you we are going to use math in your life!'

To begin, let's cover a recent reduction of Mortgage Insurance on FHA loans. MIP stands for Mortgage Insurance Premium, and it's required on all FHA (Federal Housing Admin) mortgages, and on all loans with less than 20% down payment. FHA requires insurance on every loan, regardless of downpayment.

To calculate the monthly payment we use a factor of .55% (recently reduced from .85%). If you purchased a house for say \$400K and utilized FHA mortgage, the minimum required down payment of 3.5% under the old calculations would result in a monthly MIP of \$273.42. But with the new reduced rate, the monthly payment drops to \$176.92. Under this scenario, you just picked up \$15K in additional purchasing power without changing anything on your end!

Next, let's look at MIP on a conventional mortgage. Every day, I hear comments from buyers waiting to purchase a home until they can put 20% down to avoid MIP. This is a fair concern - but misguided, and let me show you why. Assuming you have a great credit score (780) and you are looking to buy a \$400K house, waiting to save \$80K can take a long time. So,

let's look at the numbers with only 5% down: \$400K with 5% down can be done with a MIP factor of .19%, which is \$60.17 per month. If you put 15% down (\$60K), the PMI factor goes down to \$28.33 per month. These amounts only add up to around \$340-\$722 per YEAR in monthly payments! If it takes you 2 years to save the 20% down payment and that house appreciates at a modest 4%, you traded \$32,000 in equity appreciation to avoid paying less than \$2,000! That is a \$30,000 loss of equity (In Georgia the values are increasing by about 8% so you are likely losing \$60K in equity).

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

Our teacher is Ashley Wolfe, who is not only a great yoga teacher but also a Huntley Hills resident. How did a farmer's daughter from Illinois with a marketing degree end up in Chamblee teaching yoga? Read more and find out!

Ashley was raised in central Illinois on the family farm. She grew up performing – cheerleading, gymnastics, dance – and always enjoyed being in front of a crowd. 
- GFOA FY 21 **Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting** from Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada.

And remember, 'it's not bragging if you can back it up'!



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
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Overlooked Home Maintenance Issues Laura Addison, HHNA Board Member, President


Hidden issues can turn into big problems if you don't know what to look for. This article will address three hidden issues that we deal with in Huntley Hills every day and what you can do to save money and headaches down the line.

Sewer Line: Each of our houses is connected to a main sewer line in/near the street. If yours is an iron original, things are flowing on borrowed time as their average life expectancy is about 50 years. When this pipe breaks, sinks, backs up, or gets clogged with roots it can lead to a costly repair/replacement that needs to happen NOW. If you'd like to know how yours is holding up, you can always have an inspection company scope it. If you're not sure if yours has been replaced, look at the origin inside the house or for a clean-out pipe sticking up in your yard. If you see PVC, it's been replaced. Finally, many homeowner insurance companies offer a sewer line rider for just a few dollars per month. In my opinion, it's well worth the investment!

Radon: Radon is an odorless, invisible, radioactive gas naturally released from rocks, soil, and water. Radon gets into homes through small cracks or holes in your foundation. Prolonged exposure of high levels of radon can cause lung cancer. Radon IS a problem in Huntley Hills, and if you are concerned about it, you can buy a home test kit or have it tested professionally. If high levels are found, mitigation costs an average of \$2,500.

Trees: It seems every storm that passes through takes down a tree in our neighborhood. First I will mention that under Georgia law, if a tree falls on someone's property, it is generally the property owner, not the owner of the tree, who is responsible for any property damage, as well as the costs of cleaning up and hauling away the parts of the tree on your property. There is an exception: If the neighbor should have reasonably known that the tree was dead or diseased, or has received written notice by an arborist, neighbor, tenant, or other third party, they can be held responsible for any damage it causes. Therefore, it is your responsibility to remove any dead/diseased trees from your property and to remove tree-killing vines such as Kudzu from your trees to keep them healthy. It's also a good idea to notify your neighbor if you notice a dead or diseased tree on their property. The rest is up to mother nature!

As a Real Estate Agent, my clients deal with these issues all the time. I always recommend a thorough home inspection (including a radon test and sewer scope if applicable) before purchasing a home. The issues discussed above usually fall on the seller to repair and they can be pretty big-ticket items. It is a good idea to take care of these before they become an emergency or you decide to sell your home. Always better to be prepared than surprised!



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
