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

Neighborhood Nickels & Dimes

Our Budget is divided into six categories:

Administratively, we started the 2023 year off with over \$6,000 in the bank, which was higher than usual, due to the fact that we were holding money donated in 2022 for the new street sign toppers but didn't incur that expense until 2023. Other expenses were for basic operating costs. We collected \$2,113 in revenue in that category, mostly from the small donations members have been making when they pay their dues. Our members have been most generous and those little \$5, \$10 and \$20 "extras" added up to over \$1,600!

Beautification expenses were \$1,936, mostly for the cost of the dog waste bags that we pay for in the waste stations throughout the neighborhood. The rest covers flowers, planting materials and sometimes paid labor in our "common" areas if we don't have enough volunteers on Work Days. The Miscellaneous Donations noted above are mainly contributions toward the doggie bags and plantings in the park and traffic circles.



Membership revenue was \$7,346 with no expenses in 2023.

Neighborhood Connections had no expenses in 2023. This category covers the cost of materials for the Welcome Packets, but we had enough packets on-hand to deliver to all new residents.

Newsletter printing and postage costs were \$3,025 which was offset by \$3,650 in advertising revenue. Please remember to support our Advertis-

ers because they do help us to cover these costs! The newsletter is sent to every household in Huntley Hills. That's about 750 homes.


Social events totaled almost \$6,500 with Sponsorship revenue of \$1,061. Sponsors and in-kind donations covered about 75% of the costs of our biggest event – the Fall Street Party.

So, bottom line....we paid all our expenses, funded lots of great neighborhood events and ended the year with just over \$7,000 in the bank for the start of 2024. Not bad for a small, volunteer neighborhood organization!

Our 2024 Budget projects about \$15,000 in expenses and around \$14,000 in revenue, with lots of bigger and better events to enjoy. There is something on our schedule for everyone – homeowners, renters, HHNA members or not. Our activities are for the entire community, so be sure to check out our social media postings and get on the email list so you don't miss out. And if you have some ideas for new events/activities, we'd love to hear from you!

Dues are still only \$25 a year/household if you want to be a member, and signing up on the website is easy and secure. Go to www.huntleyhills.net and select the membership tab.

Enhanced Reading Instruction

Our PTA utilized fundraising dollars this summer to send 14 Huntley Hills teachers to IMSE Orton-Gillingham+ training. To strengthen our cluster, we also extended an invitation to Ashford Park Elementary and Montgomery Elementary teachers whose Foundations and PTOs paid for their training. IMSE OG+ training is an effective multi-sensory teaching approach designed to help all students, not just those who are struggling, learn to read through the practical implementation of research from Orton-Gillingham, Science of Reading, and Structured Literacy. This in-person training took place over 5 days at Huntley Hills Elementary and equipped the teachers with the knowledge, resources, and support necessary for making an immediate im-

pact in their classrooms.

Orton-Gillingham is a highly sought-after program benefitting both teachers and families looking to provide their children with a program proven to build foundational and necessary reading skills. Our school is proud to now offer this reading support and instruction in all of our Pre-K through Second Grade classrooms!



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Montford Drive Greenspace

Maybe you have seen a short clip of news on a social media site or heard a passing comment from a neighbor about a potential new greenspace in Huntley Hills. Well, it's true, the City of Chamblee has taken some steps to create another, although relatively small, space for neighbors to enjoy the outdoors and your neighborhood association has all the details!




The space in Huntley Hills in question is the lot at 3848 Montford Drive. Due to stormwater issues, the city purchased the house and lot on May 2, 2024 for \$395,000 with the intention to create a dual-purpose greenspace and stormwater management facility. The lot is currently surrounded on all three sides by other residential houses and sits near the northern intersection of Montford Drive and Greenhill Drive.

In anticipation of a Public Meeting, the City of Chamblee released a brief survey of residents through social media to collect residents' desires for that space. Then, on April 17-18, 2024, the house that was standing on the lot was demolished and cleared. The Public Meeting was held on Wednesday, May 8, 2024 at Chamblee City Hall and provided some interesting insights into the project.

The first thing that attendees at the Public Meeting learned is that the design process for the greenspace would proceed into 2025 with input from residents including live at the Public Meeting. Construction for the greenspace at that time was anticipated to begin in 2025 or 2026 with a goal for residents to be able to enjoy the greenspace sometime in 2026.

At the Public Meeting, two concepts for the greenspace were presented that include variations of play area (artificial turf), benches, concrete trails, concrete overlooks, surface inlets, outdoor fitness areas, educational signage, shade trees, ornamental trees, bio-filtration plants, natural stone retaining walls with guardrails, PIP surfacing (rubber pour-in-place playground surfacing), pollinator gardens and an underground storage tank for stormwater. The feedback at the meeting from residents included a preference for the second concept presented, pictured with this article, with feedback that natural turf might be preferred rather than artificial turf, that a connection to the other houses not in Huntley Hills on Chamdun Way might be nice addition and possibly that the outdoor gym space was unnecessary.

Since that Public Meeting, not a lot of information has been available to the public, but the lot has seen some limited lawn maintenance and the drain for stormwater has been cleared to alleviate a standing water issue. The neighborhood association will definitely remain plugged into any news about the greenspace moving forward.

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Interview with Chief Dieppa Yvonne Bubienko, HHNA Board Member, Community Relations



If you have lived in Chamblee for a while or are new to the community, one of the nicest things I can say that you will be able to count on is the accessible, personable and affable staff that makes up the City of Chamblee Government. With its newest addition Michael Dieppa, Chamblee Police Chief continues this reputation.

Originally of Miami, Chief Dieppa comes from a long line of service with his father, grandfather as well as now, his daughter working in Miami-Dade Police Department. He started his career in 1996 when his dad called him to tell him that the department was hiring. He took the job and never looked back. Continual promotions and personal drive to reach the next level led him to persue his Bachelors, then Masters and ultimately PhD to be able to be effective at his current job and stand out for the next challenge. Pursuing PHD, working full time, graduating from the FBI National Academy and helping coach his kids' baseball and football teams becomes good training ground for any challenge that life throws your way and becoming a Chief was the next goal that he set for himself professionally. Talking to Chief Dieppa you get a quick sense of a person with a high drive and high self-expectation who wants to genuinely make an impact with everything he takes on while not letting the title of the job define him and make him inaccessible. It took one quick email from me to have him carve out an hour of his time for the sole purpose of writing a quick bio that lets us get to know him better.

The Chamblee job opportunity was the right mix for Chief Dieppa. Atlanta being a large, diverse city felt somewhat familiar to him from his experience in Miami. Also, the East Coast location was preferred with family nearby. ATL Hartsfield is so often the unsung hero in the decision of being willing and able to move to Atlanta. As with any new position, he told me that the first few months of the job were filled with learning. His job, defined by him, is a relationship-based occupation. Immediately he took on learning about the new community for which he was now tasked to care for, new procedures and laws, and getting to know his staff. Fitting in is a crucial part of success for any of us, Chief of Police being no exception.

His way of creating a successful department was to be hands-on in the community, newly created Citizens Advisory Meeting which is the first of its kind for Chamblee. The last Wednesday of each month, Chief Dieppa and his staff host from 7PM to 8:30PM an open meeting where all citizens, business owners, those that live or work here in Chamblee are invited to come and voice their concerns, report an issue, asks questions or perhaps just get to know the staff. They can't fix things that they don't know about. If you come and inform them of an issue, including speeding on specific



roads, noise ordinance, cars parked illegally, and more, they promise to investigate and have a response back to you at the following month's meeting. Accountability is important and this job is relationships based. One of the main purposes of this meeting is to guide the mission of the Chamblee Police Department. If we only talk about it on Nextdoor, which we so often do, but don't let those that can fix it know that it's

a problem it will leave all of us feeling frustrated. These meetings are the way to see changes are made.

If you have the time and interest another great way of getting to know what the Police Department does is to participate in the Citizen Police Academy. It allows you to learn the basic workings of the police department and, just like Chamblee 101 Class, a great opportunity to have a front row seat at the inner workings of something that we normally don't get to experience.

Lastly, I was curious in how the neighboring cities worked together. I was pleased to learn that on a monthly basis all of the city's police departments



in Dekalb County meet not only for an exchange of information and concerns that they face as a whole, but they also learn about new changes to laws that effect how they govern and execute on those new changes.

Like many jobs in leadership role, you take on shouldering the existing responsibilities of the department. You work on getting to know and winning the trust of those that may not see you as a source of help. And you create ways of breaking the stereotypes by example. It's a job Chief Dieppa takes full on. Next time you see him, say hello, welcome him to Chamblee, he is the kind of a person who wants to leave it better than he found it.

Huntley Hills is a beautiful neighborhood. So many neighbors have lovely yards filled with colorful flowers and plants. In addition, there are several common areas that are maintained by the HHNA. These include the Butterfly Garden, the three traffic circles and the area at the south end of the park. The board would like to thank all the residents who have donated your time on a Saturday morning to help with our beautification projects. With your help, we have spread mulch, planted flowers, pulled weeds, pruned bushes and tackled ivy growing on the fence.



Last year on Earth Day, neighborhood residents were joined by members of Keep Chamblee Beautiful to clean up the creek that runs through the park. We collected numerous bags of trash, as well as some tires and shopping carts! Volunteers also cut back privet and other invasive species that were growing along the creek bed.





Another way that we help to keep the neighborhood clean and beautiful is through the

doggie waste stations. They were purchased by the HHNA in 2015 and the HHNA continues to keep them stocked with bags – over 24,000 last year! They are located throughout the neighborhood, so hopefully there is one nearby when you need it. We appreciate all of our neighborhood dog-walkers who use them to help to keep our streets and sidewalks poop-free.

From volunteering on our work days, to using the doggie waste stations, everyone plays a part in helping to keep Huntley Hills beautiful. The results of your efforts are enjoyed by those



who live here as well as those who drive and walk through our neighborhood. Keep up the good work!

Take a stroll through Huntley Hills in the spring and summer and it's easy to notice some gardens in our neighborhood seem to be buzzing with life. Ever wondered why those butterflies seem to linger a little longer in your neighbor's yard? Or perhaps you've noticed a decline in the buzzing of bees around your flowers? Pardon the pun, but the secret might be rooted in the plants themselves. Specifically, native plants can help transform your yard into a thriving ecosystem and a dazzling display.

The Power of Going Native

At first glance, native plants might not seem all that different. But these plants have evolved alongside our local climate, insects, and wildlife. This harmonious relationship offers a multitude of advantages. The benefits are impressive: they're incredibly low-maintenance, requiring less water, fertilizer, and pesticides than many non-native varieties.

The real magic happens when the pollinators arrive. Gardens with native plants become hotspots for butterflies and bees. Native trees and shrubs provide essential food and shelter for birds, bringing a variety of wildlife right to our backyards. Native plants also can help prevent erosion, especially on slopes like the ones found in our neighborhood.

Thriving Native Additions

Looking to add some native plants to your garden? Here are some natives (and nativars) that we've incorporated into our yard here in Huntley Hills:

Agastache (or Hummingbird Mint), New England Aster, 'Honey Roasted' Baptisia, Bee Balm, Coneflowers, Coreopsis, 'Sunburst' St. John's Wort, 'Florida Sunshine' Anise, and the classic Oakleaf Hydrangea. Each one brings something special to the garden.

Finding Your Balance

This doesn't mean you need to overhaul your entire garden and go 100% native. Sourcing native plants can take a bit more effort than a quick trip to the big box store, and ultimately, no plant is completely maintenance-free. There are plenty of non-native options that can thrive here and provide you with the interest you're seeking. It's all about finding the right mix for your style and creating a garden that reflects your personal taste, but adding a few native plants can make a noticeable difference in your garden's ecosystem.



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HHNA Bylaws Update Marci Hooper-Smith, HHNA Board Member, Treasurer

As with any organization, a set of rules or guidelines helps to keep the group focused on their goals and how to achieve them. A dynamic organization should review those rules and guidelines periodically to ensure that they meet the needs of the members and that the structures and processes followed by

the leaders are practical and functional in the current environment that they are operating in.

The original Bylaws were adopted in 1996, when the Huntley Hills Neighborhood Association (HHNA) was incorporated. For the most part, the key tenets of those Bylaws remain the same. Every property is eligible for membership, either through ownership or as a renter. Annual Dues were originally set at \$10 per property but were raised to \$25 several years ago. The Board of Directors still consists of nine members who serve alternating two-year terms of office - half to be elected each year at the Annual Meeting in Spring. Rules are specified for meetings, terms of



office, vacancies, quorums, voting and duties of the Officers and Directors. Pretty standard stuff.

Minor changes were made to the Bylaws in 2001, 2002, 2011 and 2018 as we grew and adapted to changes in events, community interactions, availability of volunteers, funding for events,



language clarification, Committee changes and technological advancements in communication (A biggie! Anyone remember Newsletter folding parties!!!).

In 2023, we challenged ourselves to conduct a thorough review of the Bylaws again. Several proposed revisions were approved by the membership at the Annual Meeting on March 20, 2024. Some of the significant changes included clarification of the fiscal year (Jan-Dec) and that members' dues are paid yearly, based on their

initial payment date. We also clarified the language for nominating and electing Board members and allowed vacancies to be filled by the Board of Directors until a vote by the members at the following Annual Meeting. A quorum for a called or special meeting of the membership was changed from 25% to 20% of the current membership.

The most significant changes were to the section on Officers, Directors and Committees. It has become important to elect Board members with specialized skills in communication, social media,

marketing, website design, community interaction and finance to perform the duties of some of the positions on the Board. The Functions of the Board are now more clearly defined and current duties of the Board members are spelled out in a supplementary document that can be modified by the Board at any time.

The Shadiest Shade Tree in Town

I started working on my first motorcycle almost 20 years ago, then I started maintaining my car, then my wife's, my in-laws, my parents, friends, co-workers, neighbors and now I have to rely on my wife to schedule appointments to keep things manageable. Since moving to Huntley Hills 10 years ago I've done the 1-car carport shuffle to keep the shade in my shade tree mechanic hobby, but recently we renovated and I'm spoiled with a garage! No more rain, plenty of light, and best of all I can leave a job half-done without cleaning up to give my wife her parking spot back. With that I've been able to tackle more and bigger jobs, but I've found that the most common thing friends and family need is a better understanding of preventative maintanance.

Over the years I have developed a regimen I recommend for anyone that hasn't given it much thought. Full disclosure, I'm



not a mechanic, but I'll take a look! Your owner's manual or a quick search can give you more specific information on maintenance intervals but remember - more frequent is better especially for oil changes! This has served me well for typical gas cars and light trucks, diesel and electric are another animal.



- Oil and filter every 3k to 8k miles
- Engine air cleaner (filter) every 30k to 60k miles
- Cabin filter every 15k-30k miles
- Brake pads 30k to 60k miles and rotors every other brake job (drum brakes can last a long time if you have discs up front, good to check at least every 30k miles)
- Brake bleed every 30k-50k miles or 3 years
- Wiper fluid every time you open the hood
- Wiper blades every 12-18 months
- Check exterior lights

- Suspension (shocks, control arms, sway bars) 150k-200k miles
- Drains every month especially in the fall if your car lives outdoors (some cars have drains that need to be cleaned out)
- Battery 3-5 years
- Coolant 3-5 years or 60k miles
- Power steering fluid every 3-5 years (lots of cars have electric power steering and no fluid change required)
- Tire rotation every 8k-11k miles
- Alignment after new tires or if your car pulls left/right when driving
- Spare tire pressure check every 6-months
- Tune up at 100k-125k miles (spark plugs, check brakes and suspension, water pump, serpentine belt, timing belt, water pump, idler and tensioner pullies, oil & filter, transmission fluid, differential fluid)
- Transmission service (fluid and filter if serviceable) is a highly debated topic. If you keep up with it you can drain and fill every other oil change and never worry about it. If it's been a while (60,000+ miles) you might want to do a triple drain and fill to completely flush the fluid.



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
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HHNA Social Update Stevenson Rosslow, HHNA Board Member, Social
